
Energy performance certificate (EPC)



Properties can be rented if they have an energy rating from A to E.



Properties are given a rating from A (most efficient) to G (least efficient).

Properties are also given a score. The higher the rating the lower your fuel bills are likely to be.

The average energy rating and score for a property in England and Wales are D (60).

Primary energy use

The primary energy use for this property per year is 333 kilowatt hours per square metre (kWh/m2).

What is primary energy use?

Primary energy use is a measure of the energy required for lighting, heating and hot water in a property. The calculation includes:

- the efficiency of the property's heating system
- power station efficiency for electricity

 the energy used to produce the fuel and deliver it to the property

Environmental impact of this property

One of the biggest contributors to climate change is carbon dioxide (CO2). The energy used for heating, lighting and power in our homes produces over a quarter of the UK's CO2 emissions.

An average household produces	6 tonnes of CO2
This property produces	2.8 tonnes of CO2
This property's potential production	1.7 tonnes of CO2

By making the <u>recommended changes</u>, you could reduce this property's CO2 emissions by 1.1 tonnes per year. This will help to protect the environment.

What is an energy rating?

An energy rating shows a property's energy efficiency.

Properties are given a rating from A (most efficient) to G (least efficient).

Type of assessment	 RdSAP RdSAP (Reduced data Standard Assessment Procedure) is a method used to assess and compare the energy and environmental performance of properties in the UK. It uses a site visit and survey of the property to calculate energy performance. This type of assessment can be carried out on properties built before 1 April 2008 in England and Wales, and 30 September 2008 in Northern Ireland. It can also be used for newer properties, as long as they have a previous SAP assessment, which uses

detailed information about the property's construction to calculate energy performance.
